## ACCESSORIZE THE FALL GARDEN

The weather is gradually turning cooler and even though not a leaf has yet fallen, suddenly it is time to reflect the fall season in the home and garden. It is interesting how many people comment that fall is their favorite season for *something*, from fashion to gardening, these having one common characteristic: rich and robust colors, from yellows and gold to turquoise, fuchsia, and the entire range of subtle, subdued earth tones. The flat light of fall gives greater emphasis and life to these colors.

Color is exciting, if sometimes daunting, with the confusing terminology of analogous, complimentary, monochromatic, tones, hues, and values. But, we have managed to use color in our wardrobes



without much hesitancy, so we should be able to translate it to our gardens. Begin with a good strong statement at the entry since that is where visitors get a sense of the hospitality that lies within, keeping in mind the exterior color of your home and trim as well as what colors are found just inside the entry. A monochromatic scheme is always workable and soothing to the eye; if it is too serene, it is simple to add a little pop of a contrasting color such as these contrasting heucheras.

Add a pair of new pots to the entry, cast stone is usually appropriate for a traditional home and often glazed terracotta is beautiful with Mediterranean, French, and contemporary.

Whether using cast stone or glazed terracotta, choose plant materials that echo their containers and their companion plants; there is nothing more beautiful than containers brimming with plants that have a common color throughout their blooms, leaves, veins, or stems. Remove worn out or overgrown summer annuals in existing planters and replace them with plants that will survive frost, such as English ivy or a small trailing or upright evergreen. Incorporate small gourds and pumpkins into the arrangement for a final touch. Remember to plant pots with *thriller, fillers, and spillers* and keep in mind that large containers hold more potting soil and moisture, helping plants survive in extreme temperatures, whether hot or cold.

A fresh fall doormat in compatible colors will help unify the entry vignette. If a bench is at the entry, a seasonal outdoor pillow always provides a finished look. The entry should be coordinated and abun-



dant without being theatrically overdone; not too many orange pumpkins and oddly perfect mums. With a little forethought and planning, the entry décor can also be the inspiration for the color of nearby fall annual pansies and perennials such as heucheras and nandinas in the garden border. Surrounded by such autumnal beauty, perhaps fall will become your favorite season.

Because the new growth won't have time to harden off before cold weather arrives, it can freeze or be damaged seriously. Limit pruning chores to the removing of dead branches or to doing only very minor thinning.

- Plant trees and shrubs.
- Collect dried seeds from flowers or veggies.
- Make sure all vacationing houseplants are checked for pests before bringing them back indoors.
- Plant cool season annuals.
- Cover water gardens with screen or netting to keep out falling leaves.
- It is a great time to divide overgrown perennials.
- Add compost to garden beds.
- Order bulbs if you have not done so.
- Make seasonal changes to outdoor décor.
